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ERACH & ROSHAN SADRI FOUNDATION GRANTS (UK)

Charities and organisations have the opportunity to apply for grants of between £2,000 and £100,000 through the Erach & Roshan Sadri Foundation, which seeks to support educational or welfare projects and projects that relieve poverty by alleviating homelessness. It awards grants to charities based in the UK. Most of the charities it supports have annual incomes of less than £1.5m. When the foundation was set up, its founders expected that it would give out the £6.5m within 15 years. It gives out about £600,000 a year, through about 100 grants worth between £2,000 and £50,000. A typical grant is worth between £10,000 and £20,000. The foundation gives out only one-year funding, but Cann says it looks favourably on applications from groups to which it has already given money.

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NOEL BUXTON TRUST

The Noel Buxton Trust awards grants to charities that support penal reform, the welfare of prisoners and their families, rehabilitation of prisoners and work with young people at risk of offending. The average grant is around £1700, although the Trustees can award up to £4,000 and the Trust is keen to attract applications from charitable organisations working with offenders and their families.

The Noel Buxton Trust makes grants to charities active in the following three spheres of activity:

- The welfare of children in disadvantaged families and of children in care. This will normally cover families with children of primary school age and younger, although work with children in care will be considered up to the age at which they leave care.
- Penal reform, the welfare of prisoners and their families, rehabilitation of prisoners and work with young people at risk of offending.

The Trust welcomes applications from registered charities. Exceptionally the Trust will consider appeals from charitable organisations that are not or not yet registered.

Apply by letter, setting out the reasons why a grant is being requested. Applications should include the applicant's charity registration number and the name of the organisation to which cheques should be made payable if different from that at the head of the appeal letter. Please include with your application: Budget for current and following year; Details of funding already received, promised or applied for from other sources; Latest annual report / accounts in the shortest available form.

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ELTON JOHN AIDS FOUNDATION

During the next strategic cycle, EJAF seeks to support programmes that demonstrate value for money and fully involve people living with HIV for which multi-year funding is available:

Gay and bisexual men living with HIV (MSM) - They are seeking UK wide collaborative programmes that enable MSM to manage their mental, physical and emotional health, be confident about disclosing their HIV status and reduce the risk of onward transmission of HIV. Programmes should make use of new technologies and demonstrate how they aim to measure the impact of their interventions, particularly in relation to increases in self esteem and disclosure to sexual partners and reductions in risk taking behaviour and unsafe sex.

Long Term Survivors and older people - They are seeking UK wide collaborative programmes that address the impact and social isolation of HIV on those who have been living with HIV for over 10 years and/or those aged over 50. Programmes should demonstrate how they would reach those in rural and low prevalence areas and how they aim to measure the impact of their interventions, especially in relation to reduction in social isolation and increases in HIV disclosure and use of non HIV statutory and voluntary social care services.

Employment and training - They are seeking UK wide collaborative programmes that enable people living with HIV to access training and support in order to gain employment, remain in

employment and increase their income levels. Programmes should demonstrate how they aim to measure the impact of their interventions in relation to qualifications gained, reduction in unemployment levels, increases in income levels of people living with HIV and use of non HIV employment and training services.

Children affected by HIV - They are seeking UK wide collaborative programmes that address the needs of children infected and affected by HIV, their parents and carers. Programmes for children need to demonstrate a child centred approach. All programmes should demonstrate how they aim to measure the impact of their interventions in relation to benefits on the child, their families/carers and use of non HIV statutory and voluntary social care services.

Poverty and nutrition - They are seeking UK wide collaborative programmes that address the impact of poverty on people living with HIV in the UK. Programmes should demonstrate how they aim to measure the impact of their interventions in relation to improvements in living conditions, access to culturally appropriate nutrition and increased income levels.

Regional Grants Fund - EJAF also operates a regional grants programme open to collaborative regional HIV programmes addressing the above issues, particularly those operating in Brighton, the East of England, the Midlands, London, the North West, South Central, Yorkshire and the Humber areas. Programmes should demonstrate how they aim to measure the impact of their interventions.

Robert Key Memorial Fund - EJAF has set up a new grant fund in memory of their former Executive Director, Robert Key. The prize will reward faith-based projects addressing local problems. The London strand of the prize will make awards in five different categories:

The majority of their grants are multi-year revenue grants (i.e. salaries and running costs) however Trustees will also fund capital projects that make a tangible difference to a local community. Whilst they prefer to fund organisations that are registered charities, they will consider offering grants to organisations who are pursuing charitable objectives providing their aims / constitution are clearly not-for-profit. They will only consider applications from national organisations where the beneficiaries and project workers are based within their beneficial area. Please note that charities should not apply to both the Frieda Scott and Francis C Scott Charitable Trusts at the same time and they would encourage you to seek guidance from the staff if you are unsure.

Preferred Areas of Support - In broad terms, Trustees are looking for projects that are responding to identified needs from a specific group or community. A project or service does not need to be new or innovative to receive funding support - the most important consideration is whether it is effective. The bulk of their grants are for revenue funding (running costs and/or salaries) over a number of years - please refer to their 8 year funding model for details. Within their overall aim of supporting charities who are addressing the needs of 0-19 year olds in the most deprived communities in Cumbria and North Lancashire, the following are our key priority areas:

Youth work - This Trust has long supported developmental work with teenagers and will continue to fund those projects addressing the needs of the most disadvantaged within this age group.
