## AdviceUK Consultation Response - Office of the Immigration Services Commissioner (OISC)

The Office of the Immigration Services Commissioner (OISC) regulates the provision of immigration advice and services throughout the UK, registering organisations and immigration advisers. At present, no registration fees are paid by non-fee charging organisations.



118 AdviceUK member organisations are currently regulated by the OISC. The vast majority make no charges for the advice they give, with just 12 organisations making charges for some provision, usually low-cost fixed fee services set up to cover gaps left by cuts to legal aid.

Between 14 March and 5 June 2024, the OISC, together with the Home Office, consulted on the following proposals:

- Charging both organisations and individual advisers for registration.
- Charging both organisations and individual advisers in the non-fee charging sector, including charity-based services.
- Making it possible to introduce additional charges for different types of regulatory activity.

## AdviceUK has responded to highlight:

- The significant financial pressures facing AdviceUK members giving immigration advice, with reduced public sector spending, increased competition for limited grant funding, and ongoing cost of living pressures.
- The negative impact these proposals are likely to have on the numbers of organisations able to sustain immigration advice services, particularly smaller, community-based organisations.
- The negative impact these proposals are likely to have on the advice sector workforce, where AdviceUK members tell us that it is increasingly difficult to recruit and retain suitably qualified staff.
- The positive opportunities there are for the OISC to work with the notfor-profit advice sector, and how different approaches could be found to reducing the costs of regulation and improving its effectiveness.

The OISC will be publishing its response to the consultation, alongside any changes to the fee structure in due course. AdviceUK has indicated that it is willing to share further evidence with the OISC.
